High school student age 17: "The invasion of the Ukraine. It was truly terrifying to see a country fall to its knees as Russian troops began to invade. But what this really showed was the resilience of the Ukrainian people. Having the bravery to stand up to forces larger than you takes guts. Because of this, the world has also decided to unite to protect freedom and true bravery."

Isabella, age 16: "Reflecting upon 2022, an event that stands out to me, is the worldwide effects of the war in Ukraine. Even though it started many months ago, communities are still experiencing its effects, especially from the economic standpoint. The effects of this war have trickled down to my daily

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life as I notice increased prices of goods affected by supply chain disruptions stemming from the conflict abroad."

High school student age 16: "A personal community experience that stands out for me in 2022 is the death of two students at Williamsville South High School, Lauren Taggart and Luke Malinich.

As everyone at the school grieved them, and continue to grieve, we have never been so united and supportive as a community."

Paige, age 17: "Three things that stood out to me most in 2022 is my volunteer work at a food pantry. Helping families get food and seeing their smiles makes me feel happy, knowing that I am giving back to my community."

Rosa, adult: "In the last couple of years our world has been re-shaped; pandemic, changing weather patterns, our general acceptance of violence, gambling, and marijuana. However, I feel optimistic, we are getting smarter and our young adults are leading the way. We can't go backwards, we have to move forward and support each other in a new way. Our challenges are not as deep as our capacity to meet them."
